NOTE: I of course would not expect to be sent full case notes or discussions of patients that would identify them — just the relevant sections of text with the names and any other identifiers redacted.

Response:

Hywel Dda University Health Board (UHB) is unable to provide the information requested as the information is not held as requested.

Consultation with the chaplaincy service has identified that notes and details of their consultations with patients and service users are not kept. A record of the visit is recorded within the chaplaincy service and by ward staff, but this is limited to the date, time and patient/chaplain name and ward name. All details of conversations are kept confidential, other than where a risk of harm to the patient or other individuals is identified. In such situations, this will be discussed with relevant clinical staff with the patient's knowledge, although it is limited to essential detail only.
