Subject:	Discharge delays, social care and hospital beds

### Requested:

- Could you let me know the number of qualified care workers employed with Hywel Dda or contractors commissioned by Hywel Dda for each of the last five years and further back if easy?
- 2. Could you also let me know the total number of hospital beds available to people across the Hywel Dda area for each of the last five years so I can see how things have changed? Potentially you could also provide figures for 2010 and 2015?
- 3. Could you repeat the question above exactly but for Bronglais in particular?
- 4. Could you inform me how many care homes there are in the Hywel Dda area? And compare this with 2010, 15 and 20. I'm aware this is a council matter and I will ask them too but surely you also have a record of where your patients can go if they need care.
- 5. However it is most common for it to be measured, could you provide me with any data on discharge delays? It would be good to see an average figure for each year for the last five or 10 (if possible). But I'm not sure how the data is compiled, so perhaps you could guide me.

# Clarification

1. What I mean is social care workers. Assuming there are records of this at the health board. I know it's not your responsibility but as health authority I wondered if you might have data.

### Response:

Hywel Dda University Health Board (UHB) is unable to provide you with all of the information requested for questions 2, 3 and 5, as it is estimated that the cost of answering your request would exceed the "appropriate limit" as stated in the Freedom of Information and Data Protection (Appropriate Limit and Fees) Regulations 2004. The "appropriate limit" represents the estimated cost of one person spending 18 hours (or 2½ working days) in determining whether the UHB holds the information, and locating, retrieving and extracting the information.

For questions 2 and 3, the data requested for the 2010 calendar year is not easily accessible. For question 5, the recording of discharge delays has changed numerous times over the requested period and comparable data is also not easily accessible. Therefore, in order to provide you with the data requested, the UHB would need to undertake a manual search of all computer systems, to identify the information that fulfils your request, as this is not recorded centrally.

The UHB is therefore applying an exemption under Section 12 of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FoIA), which provides an exemption from a public authority's obligation to comply with a request for information where the cost of compliance is estimated to exceed the appropriate limit.

However, under Section 16 of the FoIA, we are required as a public authority, to provide advice and assistance so far as it is reasonable, to individuals who have made a request under the FoIA. Therefore, the UHB provides the accessible information it holds below.

1. Hywel Dda University Health Board (UHB) regrets to inform you that it does not hold all of the information requested. Social Workers are employed by the Local Authorities (LA).

We would therefore recommend that you redirect your request to the Freedom of Information Teams within each LA in the UHB's footprint, who may be able to help you with your enquiry. For ease, their details are set out below:-

Please note:- The data provided above is based on the ward bed numbers provided to the Informatics Department recorded by the Services on a monthly basis. These figures do not include Field Hospitals, flex/surge bed openings or unplanned bed closures throughout the month.
