Sefyllfa / Situation

The GP Partners of Coach and Horses Surgery in St Clears applied to close their Branch Surgery in Laugharne on 14 September 2023. In line with the agreed Health Board process, public engagement events were held on 28 November 2023 and 6 February 2024. The application has been taken through the current Health Board agreed process, with consideration at a Panel review on 27 February 2024 and at Primary Care Contract Review Group (PCCRG) on 12 March 2024.

Cefndir / Background

Coach and Horses Surgery is located in St Clears and is part of the 2T's (Tywi Taf) Cluster. As of 1 October 2023, it had it had 7,253 registered patients, making it the fourth largest practice out of eight Practices within the Cluster. Of these 7,253 patients, 2259 (31.14% of total patient register) live in the Laugharne Township Ward.

Coach and Horses Surgery is open 8.00am to 6.00pm with the telephones covered until 6.30pm daily Monday to Friday.

The Practice, whilst experiencing a steadily declining patient population between January 2013 and October 2020, is now experiencing a steady increase in its patient population.

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The Practice registers patients who live within an agreed contractual boundary as detailed in the map below.





Laugharne as the Branch Surgery is contractually considered to be a GP Practice site which operates for a minimum of 20 hours per week. The Contractual Guidance which highlights and considers the components needed to qualify as a Branch Surgery. These include:

- 20 hours opening (Monday to Friday)
- Compliance with standards
- Additional and essential services
- Disputes procedures
- Outlying consultation facilities

The Laugharne Branch Surgery is located 4.2 miles by road away from the main site in St Clears.





Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic in April 2020, the Branch Surgery was open from 8.00am to 1.00pm with a doctor on duty every Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday.

The Branch Surgery closed at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic in April 2020 and has subsequently reopened in May 2021 for 20 hours per week and no longer includes any GP appointments. However, the site provides phlebotomy and chronic disease clinics which the Practice has advised have been challenging to fulfil over the past twelve months due to workforce challenges. In the intervening period, the Community Nursing Team has undertaken leg ulcer clinics twice weekly; however, this team, together with the Health Visitors, have been permanently housed at the main site in St Clears since March 2021.

Diabetic Eye Screening Wales has also been using the Branch Surgery following a request for venues to hold additional clinics to enable them to reduce the backlog of patients. The Practice has advised that this is on a temporary basis only.

Asesiad / Assessment

An application to close the Laugharne Branch Surgery was formally received from Coach and Horses Surgery on 14 September 2023.

The reasons cited for the application are detailed in which can broadly be defined as workforce and sustainability issues. At times, the Practice reports that workforce issues have prevented them from being able to operate fully from two sites. They have not had GP surgeries at the Branch Surgery since the outset of the COVID-19 pandemic in April 2020.

Prior to submitting their application, the Practice met with the Health Board to discuss the issues that they felt were impacting on their ability to run the Practice effectively. Following the meeting the Practice was provided with the process for closing Branch Surgeries and was asked to provide an up-to-date scoring on the national Sustainability Matrix.

The Sustainability Matrix provides a risk assessment matrix score, as follows:

High risk of unsustainability > or = 80

- Medium risk of unsustainability >55 -79
- Low risk of unsustainability <55

Coach and Horses had previously completed the national Sustainability Matrix in April 2023 which recorded a sustainability score of 27) which is considered a low risk of unsustainability. This was rescored in September 2023 on submission of the Branch Surgery closure application and increased by 1 point to 28, which still leaves the Practice at an assessed low risk of unsustainability.

Llais and Dyfed Powys Local Medical Committee (LMC) were made aware of the application in line with the agreed process and a Branch Practice Review Group was established, this group met fortnightly to discuss, arrange and agree of the undertaking of a public engagement exercise and its requirements as per the formal process. The Health Board Engagement team, the Communications Team and the Communications Hub fully supported the process, discussing requirements and expectations, and clarity around the engagement process was obtained. The Branch Practice Review Group agreed and established an engagement plan.

An original public engagement period was agreed to run from 1 November 2023 to 30 November 2023. Following a request from Llais, this engagement period was formally extended to 8 December 2023. The purpose of the engagement was to:

- Provide opportunities for our patients and stakeholders to give their views.
- Raise awareness of the engagement and provide opportunities for feedback.
- Target those who use the service through engagement methods that are most appropriate for these groups.
- Identify appropriate engagement and communication tools and methods to effectively engage.

The engagement period provided stakeholders with an opportunity to participate by providing their views by questionnaire, telephone, letter, scanning a QR Code, Have your Say / Dweud eich Dweud online engagement platform, email or by completing paper forms that were available from Coach and Horses Surgery, Laugharne Surgery the Community Pharmacy and Care Homes.

An analysis of the public engagement received through this process can be found at Appendix 1. There were no responses received in Welsh. The main themes of feedback received included concerns about transport, parking costs, appointment capacity at St Clears, quality, convenience, ease of access for local community, care being moved further from home, loss of service, detrimental environmental impact, property, estate matters, and finances.

An additional 59 comments were captured via Sharepoint (a combination of letters and telephone calls). The main themes of concerns raised through this route can be broadly categorised as transport, process, parking costs, access, quality, capacity, maintenance of the building and workforce.

A public drop in engagement event was held in the Laugharne Memorial Hall on 28 November 2023 from 2pm – 7pm. 115 people attended this event. The main themes of concerns raised can be categorised as transport, parking costs, appointment capacity at St Clears, quality, convenience, ease of access for local community, care being moved further from home, loss of service, detrimental environmental impact, property, estate matters, and finances.

Evaluations of both events were undertaken and are summarised at Appendix 2.

Laugharne Township Community Council set up an online petition opposing the application to close Laugharne Branch Surgery which was signed by 346 people and an additional 600+people signed a hard copy of the petition which was handed in to the Health Board in December 2023.

E-Mails and letters were received from Laugharne Township Community Council, Llanddowror, Llanmiloe Community Council, the Mayor of Laugharne and members of the public, all of which strongly opposing the application. No letters of support for the Branch Surgery closure were received.





Community Pharmacy services are easily accessible to patients without having to make an appointment and are highly valued in the communities they serve.

Smaller, often independently run, Community Pharmacies can feel they will be negatively impacted by changes to the way General Medical Services are provided through GP Practices, due to their proximity to the Pharmacy. Patients have freedom of choice over which Pharmacies they choose.

The Laugharne Pharmacy is co-located with the Post Office and a shop and is seen as part of the ecosystem of the local community, and they are co-reliant on each other. There is some concern that without a Branch Surgery in Laugharne that the viability of the Pharmacy will be threatened. The local Pharmacy has demonstrated impressive resilience through the

COVID-19 pandemic and has adapted well to new ways of working; any reduction in business would be a concern for future sustainable service provision.

Coach and Horses Surgery submitted an Equality Impact Assessment, which is included with this report as Appendix 3 and subsequently the Health Board has completed their own Equality Impact Assessment which was seen and signed off by a Senior Diversity and Inclusion Officer from the Strategic Partnership Diversity and Inclusion Team and is also included as Appendix 4.

During the engagement period, the Coach and Horses Surgery was asked to submit additional data detailing activity undertaken in Laugharne prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. This included data on the number of patients accessing services in Laugharne from November 2017 to March 2020. The Practice promptly complied with this request, and the information was discussed by the Primary Care Review Group.

Llais has fully engaged with the application process and attended both Public Engagement Events. Llais has concluded that in their opinion Laugharne Branch Surgery should remain open and be accessible to the public, due to nearly a third of its Practice list living between Laugharne and Pendine. Laugharne has an aging population with people moving into the area to retire, along with new housing developments in addition to an influx of tourists in the summer months. Furthermore, Llais feels that any Primary Care service closure risks isolating a community from the "front door" of NHS services and must only be considered as a last resort in the face of strong sustainability issues.

The LMC has fully engaged with the application process. They have outlined the broader challenges faced by General Practice and identified a number of issues that the Practice are currently facing. They highlight the sustainability, workforce and financial pressures being felt by the Practice and the benefits of multidisciplinary team (MDT) working.

Supporting documents relating to the process are provided via the Health Board website as Appendices 5-14.

Outlined below are the options to be considered regarding the application from Coach and Horses Surgery in St Clears to close their Branch Surgery in Laugharne, along with the identified benefits and risks associated with each option.

Branch Surgery Closure Panel (27 February 2024)

In line with the extant Health Board process for considering applications for Branch Surgery closures, following the conclusion of the public engagement event, a panel was convened on 27 February 2024 to consider the findings; Llais and the Local Medical Committee are both members of the panel; however, do not have a vote in making the recommendation to be considered by the Primary Care Contracts Review Group (PCCRG). In giving consideration to the options, the Panel was asked to reflect on the proactive position that the Practice has taken in considering their mid-long term future to provide a sustainable service to all of their registered patients and to further reflect on the definition of quality as being "continuously, reliably, and sustainably meeting the needs of the population that we serve". Duty of Quality Statutory Guidance (gov.wales)

Members of the Practice were invited into an open session of the panel to present their case for the closure of Laugharne Surgery.

In considering the evidence contained within the papers and the case presented by the Practice, members were divided in their considerations with three members supporting the closure and two opposing.

Primary Care Contract Review Group (12 March 2024)

In considering the outcome of the Branch Surgery Closure Panel, members were cognisant that there was not a unilateral outcome following their consideration of the evidence presented and the presentation from the GP Practice. Members noted the response from Llais, along with the outcomes from the public engagement events and the associated written responses which had been received, including a petition signed by almost a thousand patients who opposed the Branch surgery closure, and an Equality impact assessment which demonstrated that those most affected by a closure of the Branch Surgery would be those in the older age group or those with a disability. It was noted that there were varying views amongst the members of the group as to whether the application should be supported. Members reflected that the most recent Branch Surgery application received by the Health Board had been declined and the similarities and differences between both applications were drawn out during the discussion. As there is no voting function included in the Terms of Reference for the Primary Care Contract Review Group (PCCRG) there was again a divided decision on whether the application could or should be supported.

It was noted that, whilst the Practice had identified concerns over lone working and the potential for GPs to be working in isolation from the wider Practice team, the requirements of the GMS Contract for a Branch Surgery is that it is open for a minimum of 20 hours per week for the provision of General Medical Services and that this does not explicitly require the provision of face to face GP appointments. Therefore, there is the potential for the GP Practice to consider in the broadest sense the range and scope of services which could be provided from a Branch Surgery, should the application be declined. It was also noted that, whilst sustainability had been referenced as a potential concern, the Practice records a low score against the risk of sustainability challenges on the national Sustainability Framework. Members did, however, note that the concerns raised by the Practice were more about their future model rather than their current pressures. Access concerns relating to appointments at the Coach

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and Horses Practice were expressed both during and outside of the public engagement events, with patient concerns also raised around the available space within the main Practice (in particular the waiting area). Travel to and from the main site was also frequently raised as an issue of concern.

It was acknowledged by the Local Medical Committee in support of the Practice's application that a Branch Surgery could be seen as being a barrier to future GP recruitment alongside the financial implications of running more than one Practice site. The uncertainty around future contract negotiations and the impact that this could have on the business viability of GP Practices was also considered.

Taking all views into consideration, the evidence included within the papers, the feedback from patients and the Practice representatives which have been collated during the process, the response from Llais and other stakeholders, the Chair of the group concluded that, based on the evidence that had been presented, the application could not be supported at this point in time. However, there was an appetite to support the Practice in the range of services which could be appropriately provided in a way that delivered care to patients from the Branch Surgery; thereby continuing with some local access, whilst noting that communication with patients regarding available services at the Branch Surgery and the model of working would need to be supported.

It was noted that the process to consider Branch Surgery closure applications also needed to be reviewed, as members identified that a more streamlined process would assist in reaching a recommendation.

<u>Argymhelliad / Recommendation</u>

The Board is asked to:

- NOTE the process that has been undertaken including the level of response from the public engagement programme and the submission from Llais.
- NOTE that, in coming to a conclusion, there has been a divide in views from panel and PCCRG members.
- APPROVE the recommendation that, on the balance of information presented, the Branch Surgery closure application be declined, subject to further work with the Practice around their future model for the delivery of General Medical Services.
- REQUEST a review of the Primary Care decision-making arrangements, in order to streamline the process.

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


Q2 When was the last time you attended Laugharne Branch Surgery?

Q3 Thinking about the last time you went to Laugharne Branch Surgery, how did you travel there?



Q4 When was the last time you attended Coach and Horses Surgery?





First the only reason I haven't been to Laugharne surgery for more than a year is because I can't get any appointments there even when I needed blood taken I had to drive to St clears which impacted significantly time wise on my NHS work - I lost half a days pay from my clinics due to travelling and waiting time to see a Dr. Obviously that impacted on the nhs staff who would have undergone consultations with me, so they were delayed further. There are I believe at least a couple of pertinent points from the GPs and their discussion about closing the surgery. They state that 31percent of patients come from Laugharne pre Covid I believe that approx 50 patients were seen by a dr and nurse in a morning clinic - this means that 50 people will drive to st Clears and back each morning instead of two healthcare workers which seems very unenvironmentally friendly and does not take into account the stress and wellbeing of patients. This week my neighbour stood outside the StClears surgery because the waiting room was full. Surely 31percent of patients from this area which is growing with more housing developments should equate to 31 percent of clinics held by the Drs in Laugharne. I find it

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frankly quite shocking that they admit that they have not complied with the requirements of the disability aspect of 2010 - over 12 years since its implementation and prior to that the DDA in relation to access and facilities. Having worked across three PCTs in England this I think shows a business where disability is not key to primary healthcare and such the monitoring by the Healthboard for compliance and solutions is abysmal. The GPs have also used as part of their argument to close the surgery the fact it needs thousands of pounds to be spent on it for repair. Most businesses ensure this as part of their ongoing costs so perhaps poor business management is key to this and the surgery should be kept open with greater monitoring on compliance with health and safety and disability compliance. Today I was given a lift to St Clears, I then waited one and a half hours in the cold for the return bus which aggravated my chronic musculoskeletal symptoms and I have subsequently spent the last four hours lying on my bed. If the surgery had been in Laugharne I'd have walked there and back ten minutes each way. Another discussion point from the GPs is that two Drs are required incase of an emergency. This is not a requirement and pre covid only one Dr was present. All surgery staff should undergo resuscitation training and actually if you have two GPs present I believe from my own experience running nhs clinics where there have been anaphylactic reactions the ambulance service actually put you lower in the line for paramedics if there is a Dr present. All that is required is a Dr or registered nurse or first aider and one other person who can act as support and call999 in an emergency situation. As the population of full time people who live in Laugharne increases the amount of wealth often decreases so the ability to pay for taxis makes it more difficult. I have not once despite asking in many occasions to book a routine appt in the future with a Dr been able to do this in ST Clears - the econsult system was great but appears to have been removed from the website -mind you I've always ended up having to go to St Clears that day to be assessed face to face by a Dr. Despite the website saying you can book appts online I have never achieved this as it always says appts not available. My neighbour doesn't have a smart phone so each time she tries to ring the surgery at 8:00 she has to manually press the numbers on her phone - my average before the phone is picked up is usually about 80 attempts which are easy with redial on a smart phone. I often am too late and have to try again the next day or give up. I think that the ways of working mean that like me i get to the point of I can't be bothered seeing a Dr and by the time you get to one your health is much worse than if you had better access. Primary care seems to have failed to recognise the difficulties of living in rural communities where public transport is infrequent so even if you can get an appt on the day you often have to beg a lift from a friend or neighbour as £15 each way for a taxi is prohibitive. The residents in Laugharne should have healthcare provision closer to their homes where they can walk or at least park

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without having to pay for parking as occurs in Laugharne. Also primary care should be about preventative as well as reactionary healthcare and the Laugharne surgery has fantastic opportunities for many wellbeing clinics to be held there, smears bloods diabetic checks respiratory checks some income generation options for provision if travel vaccines and occupational health to name a couple of services where they could make more money. Whilst I appreciate that it is difficult to recruit drs to rural surgeries what a fantastic learning opportunity for Drs to work across multiple sites, the use of electronic records negates the need to be in one surgery and the GPs can still communicate with each other across more than one surgery. It would also make it easier for Siggerys our local pharmacist to be able to pick up prescriptions from Laugharne rather than StClears. When one is ill whether chronic or acute easy prompt access to efficient services makes such a difference to the end user. The Laugharne surgery could also be used as a hub for triaging and for other functions which would benefit the Healthboard such as blood donation breast care and eye clinics perhaps setting up an nhs dentists etc. I implore of you to listen to the residents about our needs. I note that the information provided by the surgery states that the bus journey is only 15mins. This is often not the case, the times of the buses don't necessarily coordinate with available appointment times and you could find yourself having to travel a couple of hours before your appointment in order to be sure you are on time. Travelling back can also involve waiting an hour or so for a bus. If you're young and

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fit this is possible but takes you away from your work for an unacceptable time (to some employers). If you are old (I'm 66 so only going to get less mobile) it is very difficult to be hanging around waiting for this amount of time, especially in the colder/wetter weather. It is very difficult to make an appointment ahead of time, often you have to ring at 8am on the day so planning shared car use is very difficult. I also care for elderly parents, one is housebound so is taken care of by the district nurse team at home but, the other attends Laugharne surgery a couple of times a week. If Laugharne were to close then they would have to be taken twice a week to St Clears. All the above problems would still apply but with a very frail elderly person attached to them. I believed that health care was supposed to be heading more community based but this centralising seems to be for the benefit of the staff not the patients. There are many ways that the surgery could modernise/streamline to improve/make it more efficient such as using the latest IT such as online booking systems (at the moment there never seems to be any appointments available)

It is only in relatively recent times since the removal of Doctor availability and reduction in services offered that I have had to attend St Clears - Coach & Clears - Clea Horses Surgery. This has caused me great difficulties as I have quite a complex number of health issues that require regular blood tests and monitoring as well as consultations. My experience has been one of a much reduced availability of appointments, difficulty getting to see a Doctor and great inconvenience in getting seen and never at the time that has been arranged because there are always delays. When I first moved to Laugharne the Laugharne surgery was a drop in surgery on designated weekdays and very convenient. It much later changed to an appointment system but had its own designated phone line and it was well organised and provided a good service which was very much appreciated. Also you were able to see a nurse most days and organise local blood tests. I would argue that the existence of Laugharne surgery which ran with a minimum of staff and a visiting Doctor on select days removed pressure from the main surgery in St Clears (Coach & amp; Horses) and helped it to run more smoothly. I also act as a carer for my housebound mother and my 90 year old Father who both live in Laugharne. My Father is the main carer although he himself has many serious health issues one of which means he has to attend Laugharne Surgery twice a week. While he is doing this my mother needs to be cared for and even

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Laugharne surgery is nowadays too far for my Father to walk to so if well enough he drives but when he can't we take him. My mother cannot be left for long so as you will understand between my wife and I we have to do quite a lot of juggling and be available to support them both for their medical appointments. When these appointments are not in Laugharne it is a major inconvenience and not always possible to organise at the right time. St Clears is a much longer journey for my Father to cope with and with arranged appointments frequently delayed and blood tests and checks frequently required I fear we will not be able to cope with attending as regularly as required in the future. So for me personally and my family the closure of Laugharne Surgery is a backward step not a progressive one as it is being sold. I am very much against it and hope it does not happen as I know it will be detrimental to my own health and my families health in many, many ways. The digitally excluded do not benefit from the development of video calls or e-consult, which is also of no help when needing physical contact, whether to have an examination or an injection, blood test etc. Laugharne's population is growing, with two new housing estates being built, and it has a large % of older people, who are heavier users of health services. It needs an enhanced local primary care service, not a reduced one. Your

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statistics show the Laugharne Township share of patient numbers to be 2259 or 31% compared to 2852 or 39% for St Clears and Llansteffan, evidence of the large number of people who are going to be negatively affected by the closure, as they already by the reduction in availability of services. Local services being withdrawn and centralised has a negative impact on sustainability, requiring increased car travel for those able to drive and reduced access for those who cannot afford to run a car, to use expensive buses or get unaffordable taxis, who risk their health conditions worsening or remaining undiagnosed because of the increased obstacles to access to primary health care. 


